## 2.12 How does IQAC Contribute/Monitor/Evaluate the Teaching & Learning processes :

IQAC ensures the regular conduct of Internal examinations every semester and the timely publication of results. Transparency is ensured in these processes. Grievances if any are resolved through the Internal Assessment Grievance Redressal Cell. Evaluation of the teachers is conducted every semester and feedback is reported to the Principal, who in turn conveys the same to the teachers and gives them necessary directions. Steps are taken to conduct remedial classes for slow learners of every department. Meetings with the parents are also held following the publication of end semester exam results. Results are intimated to the parents and their suggestions are sought to adopt appropriate measures to improve the performance of slow learners.

- Students have been regularly visiting and serving the inmates of destitute and old age homes like Snehaniketan, Devadan centre and Snehabhavan, all situated in the nearby locality. These programmes are coordinated by the Mother Teresa Charity Wing.

#### 5.6 Details of student counselling and career guidance

- Career awareness programme on opportunities for graduates in Healthcare Industry as Medical Scribes was organized on 11<sup>th</sup> December 2017. Sri. 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

#### 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Since the curriculum is designed and implemented by the university the college only adheres to the orders issued. Faculty serving as members of Boards of Studies communicate the suggestions and recommendations of the institution, if any, to the concerned Boards and required modifications to the existing curriculum are made. The institution devices its own academic calendar at the beginning of the academic year and curriculum is implanted in accordance with it.

#### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Conventional teaching-learning methods have been partly replaced by modern gadgets like smart boards, projectors and presentations. Video assisted learning has considerably improved the quality of learning and has helped to make teaching more effective. Effectiveness of the learning process is constantly assessed though test papers, quizzes, debates etc. The regular conduct of internal examinations and publication of results also ensure the systematic learning by students.

#### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

As part of the continuous evaluation process student learning is assessed through periodical class tests and regular internal examinations in each semester. This gives the students awareness regarding their standards and help to improve their performance. Results of these tests are published regularly and feedback is given to students and the same is intimated to the parents also.

#### 6.3.4 Research and Development

Thrust is given to improving the research facilities of the institution and to promote the research climate. The research committee updates the faculty on opportunities available for research activities, paper presentations etc. As an outcome of the consistent efforts Chemistry department was sanctioned an amount of 35 lakhs by the SARD. A research centre was approved in the Department of Physics. 3 Ph.Ds were awarded during the year, one faculty has been pursuing research under the FDP and one faculty in Physics was approved as a research guide.

#### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

ICT enabled teaching methods are used in classrooms. Powerpoint presentations are effectively used by faculty and students. Science laboratories are equipped with modern equipments. Library has been partly computerised. Around 1300 books worth Rs. 3,70,000 lakhs were added during the period.

New washrooms were constructed for boys.

#### 6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Students are provided opportunities for all round development of their personality and to walk out of the institution as balanced personalities of learning and wisdom. The NSS, NCC, AICUF etc provide avenues of training and personality development for the students. They emerge as capable leaders to guide the other members of their group. Activities of the college union also provide them with opportunities and hands-on training in running a democratic system. With regard to the faculty, opportunities to attend Orientation/Refresher courses help them develop their skills as teachers.

#### 6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Faculty and staff are recruited strictly in adherence to UGC & government norms. Vacancies of temporary/guest lecturers are advertised in newspapers and are selected through interviews . Appointments in this regard are made on a yearly contract. To cope with the shortage of adequate non-teaching staff, appointments were made on contract basis. Four permanent teaching faculty were recruited during the year.
